Eponym

This species is dedicated to the teacher Adriana Judith Joya Bohórquez for her great observation skills and passion for the genus *Echeveria*. She has contributed to the localisation of new species for Colombia, particularly in the Department of Santander. *Echeveria adrianae* was the first *Echeveria* she observed in habitat and the one that awakened her curiosity and interest in the knowledge of this type of plant in her home state (14).


Flowering time July to September.

The date of collection of this new species was in early August (12).

Echeveria mutisii Reyes, Anguiano and Giraldo-Cañas sp. nov.

Echeveria mutisii; *E. cojitambensi* Pino et Kabir Montesinos similis sed diametro caulis 1.5–2.2 cm (vs. 2.3 cm), foliis brevioribus 3.5–5 cm (vs. 7–13 cm), longitudine caulis floralis 45 cm (vs. 40–60 cm), pedicellis longioribus 8–10 mm (vs. 1–2 mm), petalis aurantiacis, flavis apicem versus, intus vitellinis (vs. Aurantei-roseis, intus aurantei-flavis), gynoeceum 6–7 mm longo (vs. 11–12 mm), stylo bicolore basi flavido, ad apicem purpureo (vs. unicolori viridi-flavo), stigma viridi (vs. rubro) differt (15).

Description

Perennial plant, glabrous. Stems usually pendulous, sinuous, branched from base to 1.5 m long, 1.5–2.2 cm thick, greyish to somewhat lustrous. Rosettes compact, 10–12 cm in diameter. Leaves elliptic to ovate, 3.5–5 cm long, 2–3 cm wide, bluish-green, slightly pruinose, base truncate, margin reddish, abaxially keeled, adaxially slightly grooved and beveled, mucronulate, often tinged purple, especially toward the tip. Flowering stem 1–2 per rosette, erect to recurved toward
